Limited Enrollment Program Admission Requirements: Since Psychology has been designated as a Limited Enrollment Program (LEP), the major requires higher standards than the satisfactory progress benchmarks required in non-LEP majors. Students must meet certain minimum criteria in order to remain in the major or gain access to the major.

LEP Enrollment Policies:

- Only one gateway/entrance course may be repeated and may only be repeated once.
- When more than one course can satisfy a gateway requirement, taking a second course from the list will count as a repeat.
- A grade of a W (Withdrawn) in a course is counted as an attempt.
- Students may apply only once to an LEP. Students who choose to leave the major or are directly admitted and fail to meet the review criteria will be dismissed from the major and may not reapply.
- Students in the major must maintain a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.00. Failure to do so will result in dismissal from the major.

First semester freshmen entering the University as PSYC major: Students must complete the following requirements **within 45 credits** (not including AP/IB credits) to remain in the major.

- PSYC100 with a grade of B- or higher
{If AP/IB PSYC100, then PSYC221 with B- or higher}
- BSCI170/171 with a grade of C- or higher
- MATH120, 140 or 136 with a grade of C- or higher (Must be in a major in CMNS-Biological Sciences to take MATH136)

Students who wish to be PSYC after their first semester:

Students may submit an application to declare PSYC as a major after completing the LEP admission requirements listed below.

- PSYC100 with a grade of B- or higher
{If AP/IB PSYC100, then PSYC221 with B- or higher}
- BSCI170/171 with a grade of C- or higher
- MATH120, 140 or 136 with a grade of C- or higher (Must be in a major in CMNS-Biological Sciences to take MATH136)
- Minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.70 in all previous college-level coursework

**** PSYC majors are not permitted to take more than 3 PSYC courses in a given semester.****
